The boy in the striped pyjamas

You have to leave the only world you know because the Second World War is coming, you and your family are going to a place called Auschwitz. You do not want to go. Beginning to get used to the life here, Bruno was informed that he, along with his sister and mother, would all be moving back to Berlin because this was not a suitable environment to bring up two young children. However, just before their departure date, Bruno does something that no one will ever forget...

It's a touching tale of an odd friendship between two boys in terrible circumstances and a reminder of man's capacity for inhumanity.

In this capturing book, my favourite character is Bruno because he is a nice, caring person and is not afraid to take risks. For example, he brings food to Shmuel, knowing that if he was caught he would be in serious trouble. Additionally, Bruno is an extremely clever person.
